



Mahatma Gandhi, whose full name was Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, played an important role in the fight for India's independence from British rule, becoming a global symbol of peaceful resistance. Born on 2nd October 1869 in Porbandar, India, Gandhi adopted the philosophy of non-violence and civil disobedience as ways to protest.

After studying Law in England, Gandhi first began to apply his ideas of peaceful resistance in South Africa, where he defended the rights of the Indian community in the country. He later returned to India and became the leader of the Quit India independence movement, inspiring thousands of people to peacefully protest against injustices carried out by the British.

In addition to mobilising the Indian population against British laws, his civil disobedience campaigns, which included the famous Salt March, raised international awareness of their fight for independence.

Gandhi is remembered as a political strategist, but also as an activist and philosopher whose principles of love, peace and non-violence made a profound impact on civil movements across the world.

He was assassinated on 30th January 1948, but his legacy as one of



Adolf Hitler was a political figure who led Germany from 1933 to 1945. He was born in Austria but moved to Germany as a young child and fought in the German army during the First World War. After the war, he joined the Nazi Party (formally, the National Socialist German Workers' Party), gaining power within the party due to his public speaking skills and profoundly nationalist,

anti-capitalist and antisemitic ideology.

He became chancellor of Germany in 1933 and quickly consolidated power, establishing a dictatorial regime known as the Third Reich, which was characterised by its expansionist, militaristic and genocidal policies. These policies brought about the Second World War, a war that caused tens of millions of deaths and widespread destruction.

Hitler's regime collapsed in 1945 when the Allies defeated Nazi Germany. He killed himself in his bunker in Berlin when the Soviet armed forces invaded the city on 30th April 1945. The atrocities committed under his command left a trail of death and destruction and had an enormous impact on 20th century history.

They serve as a sombre reminder of the dangers of fanaticism, racism and totalitarianism.

God, Hitler and Gandhi walk into a bar... is a debating and acting game in which the aim is to put yourself in someone else's shoes, defending ideas you disagree with or attacking ideas you do agree with.

To make the game more fun, try playing different characters whose opinions and attitudes are different to your own.

Contents:

- 100 Debate Cards + 12 Blank Cards which you can customise with your own statements
- 1 Judge's Gavel
- 1 God's Dice
- 6 Help Tokens
- 1 Gandhi Card (defence) + 1 Hitler Card (attack)
- 1 Digital Timer (Web app)

• Objective: Be the first to win five debates by arguing for or against each statement. The player playing the role of the fickle God will decide the winner of each round.

• Game setup:

- Choose who will play God this game and give them the Gavel and the God's Dice.

- The remaining players must divide into two teams.

- Each team will receive three Help Tokens.

- Place the pack of Debate Cards on the table with the defence and attack arguments face down.

• The dice:

The dice decides which skill the fickle God will be looking for each round.



Sense of humor: God will want to see jokes, witticisms and sarcasm in the players' performances.



Argumentative skills: God will appreciate each player's ability to present logical arguments.



Inspiring Speeches: God will look for enthusiasm, persuasiveness and ability to mobilise a crowd.



Speed of Reasoning: God will only care about the speed at which arguments are presented and is uninterested in whether they are logical or accurate.



• How to play:

1. God rolls the dice.

2. God chooses a card from the Debate Card pile.

3. God decides who will be Team Gandhi (defence) and Team Hitler (attack) and gives them their respective identification cards.

4. God reads the statement on the Debate Card out loud to the teams and asks them if they need any help.



Team Hitler must always ATTACK the statements on the Debate Cards.



Team Gandhi must always DEFEND the statements on the Debate Cards.

- Help Tokens: If a team needs some help forming their arguments, they can give God one of their Help Tokens in exchange for the Debate Card, where they'll find arguments for and against each topic. The team keeps the card throughout that debate.

5. God opens the debate by striking the gavel against its block.

PLEASE NOTE: God will ONLY value the characteristic rolled on the die.

- The teams have one minute to prepare their arguments.

- Team Hitler will then begin to present their arguments and has one minute to ATTACK the statement. It is then Team Gandhi's turn, who has one minute to DEFEND. Repeat this process three times.

6. Once the time is up, God strikes the gavel and decides who has won the debate, giving the Debate Card to the winning team.

7. A new debate begins, following the same process, with Team Hitler going first. Repeat the same process for the subsequent debates **until one team has managed to win five Debate Cards.**

You may play without help, increasing the game's difficulty level.
